Teachers Receive \$205,576 in PRIME Grants!

RIMSD Teachers and Administrators attended a special PRIME Grant awards presentation held on August 1st at Circa '21 Dinner Playhouse. A record \$205,576 was awarded to fund 99 projects developed by the teachers, departments, and schools of the Rock Island-Milan School District. 119 RIMSD



Educators received these PRIME Grants for innovative projects, technologies, and/or materials to be used in the 2023-2024 academic year. Every school in the district had at least one teacher or educator receive a grant. The grants will benefit the 6,100+ students of the Rock Island-Milan School District this year and several will continue to benefit students in future academic years. Innovative projects were funded for projects in literacy, science, physical education, special needs, music, art, global understanding, and more! A Barbara Fackel PRIME Grant and four "Rock Island Art Guild" PRIME Grants were presented. A generous donation from John Hass funded 3 awards received by Earl Hanson Elementary.

Teachers and other educators submit their PRIME Grant applications with project proposals in late May. Individual teachers may apply for up to \$1,500, departments or schools up to \$3,000, and those applying for programs affecting multiple schools may request up to \$5,000. A new online system contracted through Kaleidoscope streamlined this year's application process. The PRIME Grant Committee comprised of RIMEF board members, retired RIMSD educators, and a representative from the Dept. of Teaching and Learning evaluate each application and make the final determination for the awards. All projects must be completed within the school year and a follow-up report with photos is sent to the RIMEF.

PRIME stands for "Promoting Rock Island Milan Education." The RIMEF believes that every student is entitled to a quality education and this critical program perfectly aligns with our mission to "enhance academic opportunities for student success." The PRIME Grant Program is made possible through funding from our donors and the generosity of: Rauch Family I Foundation, Rock Island Art Guild, Alfaretta Young Foundation, Junior Board of Rock Island, Doris and Victor Day Foundation, and the Barbara Fackel Fund. Contributing to the PRIME Grant fund is an excellent way for dedicated donors to have a direct impact on student achievement throughout the Rock Island-Milan School District.

GRITGRANT Award!

Rocky senior, Daivari Rogers was named as a 2023 GritGrant Award recipient at a ceremony held on August 28 at Rock Island High School. Daivari is one of just five students internationally to receive the McKenzie Foundation and Uncharted Learning award. Rocky is the only high school within the Incubatoredu program to have multiple winners of the GritGrant Award.

GritGrants are cash awards recognizing students who show resilience and character to reach their goals. Incubator instructor Mrs. Patricia Matson nominated Daivari based upon the award's criteria:

- Optimism, confidence, and creativity
- Resilience
- Focus on meaningful goals
- Excellence
- Character as it refers to ways of thinking, acting, and feeling that benefits both oneself and others

Mrs. Matson stated that Dairvari exemplified all these elements and while facing some setbacks, he continued to work hard and persevered.

Jim McKenzie of the McKenzie Foundation presented Daivari a crystal plaque and check at the afternoon's event. In addition, he gave ten laptops – one for Daivari and the rest for, upon graduation, nine deserving seniors of Incubatoredu. Also attending were Chief Evangelist of Uncharted Learning Margarita Geleske, RIHS/RIMSD administration, RIMEF Director Monta Ponsetto, and current/former students of Rocky's Incubatoredu class.



Donors Making a Difference: The Hass Family

The Hass family has been a part of the Rock Island community for generations. In the early 2000's, the family established the 1st Rock Island-Milan Education Foundation (RIMEF) scholarship to be awarded to honor students in Rock Island and the city of Rock Island itself. The Hass Family Scholarship was the family's way of giving back to the community that had been good to them and supported their business (Valley Construction.) It was also a beautiful way to honor Mary and Art Hass who made Rock Island their home. All of Mary and Art's children, Jim, Bill, & John and their spouses Nancy (Bill) & Sandy (John) and all eight of their grandchildren graduated from Rocky with a wonderful education.

The brothers wanted the Hass Family Scholarship to go to a B-average student. At the time, they felt so many scholarships that were available from other organizations or colleges were just for the top students. They wanted to recognize that there were several very strong students who weren't necessarily the highest ranked but who also deserved recognition and financial assistance. The scholarship was formed and was made open to students with a 3.0 GPA or better, leadership skills, and good character. The students receiving the award must not be in the top 10 of their class.

Of course, RIMEF co-founder Rose Ann Hass (Jim) helped to establish the scholarship. Rose Ann wasn't a graduate of Rocky nor was she even from Rock Island (she was from Muscatine) but, as she states, you "move to Rock Island and you become a Rock Island patriot and avid 'Rock Islander.'" Rose Ann's work in researching what other school foundations were doing for their districts helped shape the initial focus of the RIMEF. She was elected the 1st President of our organization and after initially retiring from her many years of service to the Foundation, came back and graciously served another nine years on the Board of Directors.

In addition to funding the Hass Family Scholarship in perpetuity and serving on our board/committees, various members of the Hass family have generously donated to our General Fund, the Austin Academic Achievement Awards, and PRIME Grants along with funding other specific programs or materials. The Hass family continues to give back to our community and has made our mission their mission by enhancing academic opportunities for student success.

PRIME Grants in Action!




