PRIME Grants Award Record \$158,404!



The 2022-2023 School Year began with \$158,404 in PRIME Grants awarded to the teachers, departments, and schools of the Rock Island-Milan School District. The Rock Island-Milan Education Foundation presented its PRIME Grants at the opening day in-service meeting held on August 2nd in Augustana College's Centennial Hall. 76 projects from 94 educators were funded for programs, technologies, and/or materials to be used this year. Every school in the district had at least one teacher or educator receive a grant.

Over 6,100 students of the Rock Island-Milan School District will benefit from these PRIME Grants with innovative projects in literacy, science, physical education, special needs, music, global understanding, and more! This year through new gifting, the RIMEF was excited to add multiple "Rock Island Art Guild" PRIME Grants specifically aimed to encourage and support art projects in all grade levels K-12.

Teachers and other educators submit their PRIME Grant applications with project proposals in late May. Individual teachers may apply for up to \$1,500, departments or schools up to \$3,000, and those applying for programs affecting multiple schools may as for up to \$5,000. The PRIME Grant Committee comprised of RIMEF board members, retired RIMSD educators, and a representative from the Dept. of Teaching and Learning evaluate each application and make the final determination for the awards. All projects must be completed within the school year and a follow-up report with photos must be sent to the RIMEF.

PRIME stands for "Promoting Rock Island Milan Education." The RIMEF believes that every student is entitled to a quality education and this critical program perfectly aligns with our mission to "enhance academic opportunities for student success." The PRIME Grant Program is made possible through funding from you, our donors, and the generosity of Junior Board of Rock Island, the Rauch Family Foundation, the Doris and Victor Day Foundation, and the Rock Island Art Guild. The PRIME Grant fund is an excellent way for our dedicated donors to have that direct impact in our schools and on student achievement throughout the Rock Island-Milan School District.

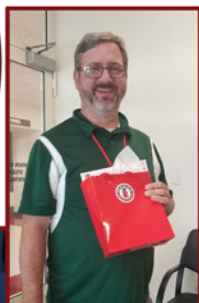

Students at Earl Hanson have a new, purple playground thanks to the generosity of a donor who works to effect change in her community: Heidi Huiskamp Collins. A ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on August 26 to the delight of the students who were allowed to climb, slide, and hang from the equipment after waiting since the start of the school year. The \$150,000+ gift to construct the playground was made through the Rock Island-Milan Education Foundation.

A new, safe playground for the students was a high priority item on Principal Sarah Leonard's wish-list. Earl Hanson's PTO started reaching out to some of its community connections to find a donor. One parent got in touch with Heidi who then contacted the RIMEF. After some work by the district to obtain bids and approval by the school board, the construction work began in June and was completed in August.

Approximately \$100,000 of that total has been returned directly back to the participating schools with the remaining earnings supporting our PRIME Grant program benefitting all our students and schools. Elementary students throughout the district sold the \$15 cards with every card they sell being credited to the students for prizes and to their schools for projects or items they elect.

“Olivia: I learned that without a balanced environment, a lot of things will begin to die and it has a domino effect on the rest of the ecosystem. For example, when our fish died, our plants were starting to die so we knew something was wrong and we had to make a change. I liked how we could be independent and we’re responsible for the care of other organisms”

“One of our success stories was when we were reading about how difficult it was for some students to get books to their part of their country, students were able to brainstorm ideas and then take their ideas into conceptual forms to solve this problem. Another...was when we read about people needing clean, fresh water in an African country. Students had to devise a way to get water from the ground to help stop the famine and promote growth in these areas. In both cases, students then presented their ideas to the class for constructive feedback. Students would then go back to their project and make modifications based on feedback they received.”

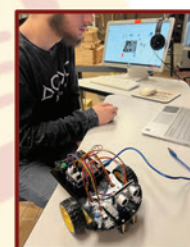
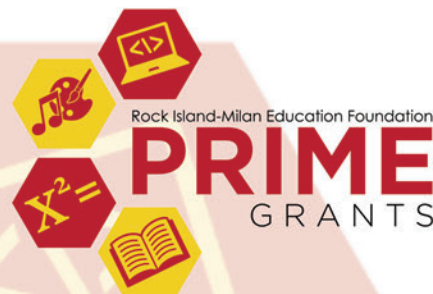
